Headteacher Update



It was a pleasure to welcome students back and to hear all about their half terms and see them all refreshed. Furthermore, it was great to see that our students are certainly striving towards

excellence with our school focus on fundamental standards and I know they will continue to do so. A reminder that our focus for this half term is for students to be organised with homework and their planners. I would also like to take this opportunity of reminding parents about our Sutton Experience and extensive extra-curricular programme which has been updated for the current half term. I know how enriching these clubs can be for our young people, including learning new skills as well as meeting new people.

Attendance Updates

Why is it important for children not to miss school?

Most parents/carers want their children to get on well in life. Nowadays, it is more important than ever to have a good education behind

you if you want opportunities in adult life. Children only get one chance at school, and your child's chances of a successful future may be affected by not attending school or alternative provision regularly. If children do not attend school regularly, they may not be able to keep up with school work. In a busy school day it is difficult for schools to find the extra time to help a child catch up and it's not only the academic work: missing out on the social side of school life can affect children's ability to make and keep friendships, a vital part of growing up. Setting good attendance patterns from an early age will also help your child later on. Employers want to recruit people who are

reliable. So children who have a poor school attendance record may have less chance of getting a good job.

Being on time is also vital. Arriving late at school can be very disruptive for your child, the teacher, and the other children in the class.

Research has shown that children who are not in school are most vulnerable and are thus more easily drawn into crime. Those children who play truant are more likely to offend than those that do not. Research also shows that less than 40% of pupils in secondary schools with an average of 17 days or more absence get 5 good GCSEs (grades 4 plus compared to more than 90% in schools with an average of less than 8 days absence). Many parents are surprised how quickly their children accumulate 15 days absence.

Every lesson in school matters and children who have time off find it difficult to catch up.

What does the law say?

By law, all children of compulsory school age (between 5 and 16) must get a suitable, full-time education. As a parent, you are responsible for making sure this happens, either by registering your child at a school or by making other arrangements which provide a suitable full-time education. Once your child is registered at a school you are responsible for making sure he or she attends regularly. If your child fails to attend regularly - even if they miss school without you

















knowing - the Local Authority (LA) may take legal action against you. The Local Authority (Staffordshire County Council) is responsible for making sure that parents fulfil their responsibilities. Parents are responsible for making sure that their registered children regularly attend school and any alternative provision for them. We want to work with all our students and their parents/carers to maximise attendance and give every student every opportunity to maximise their choices throughout life. We understand that there are many reasons why a students attendance might not be as good as we or you might wish and want to work together to support the student in attending school and maximising their life chances.



It has been another busy term for our wonderful Year 7. Not only have they been instrumental in our charity fundraising event for CAFOD and Ukraine, a lot of them have also been



actively involved in the school play, Acts of Worship and various committees throughout the school. Furthermore, it has been a pleasure to watch them flourish and enjoy their new playground freedom, which allows them to socialise with another year group for the first time in their BRS journey. This has been so successful and just shows us what we already know - how amazingly resilient they are. Plus, it was superb to welcome some of their Year 6 teachers into the school on our INSET day. It was a wonderful opportunity to show off some of the Year 7 books and to allow their Year 6 teachers to see that their past students are still thriving and showing amazing pride in the quality and presentation of their work.

From our Year 10 Prefects

For the past few weeks, the Student Leadership Team have been working on a few projects to help either the school, the students in it or the world around us. Some of the projects that the Student Leadership teams are doing are:

- School reusable water bottles.
- Better recycling in school.
- Giving away old school uniforms to people that can't get them.
- And much more.

Reusable Water Bottle

Upon our research we have found out that a single



plastic bottle can last up to 450 years in the marine environment, slowly breaking into smaller and smaller pieces which eventually end up so small that it won't be visible but never truly go away. This means that nearly every piece of plastic that has ever been

produced is still within the ocean. This fact inspired us to start having reusable school water bottles. So, we have contacted the Headteacher of our school, Miss O'Leary, and have politely asked if it would be possible for the school to fund this project. Further, from our research we have

discovered that around 100 million marine animals die each year from plastic waste alone. Some studies have even found out that 90%



of certain species have ingested some plastic, and by 2050, nearly all 99%, will have eaten plastic.
Counteracting this will be hard to do, however, as a whole we can help reduce our plastic waste to do our part in the contribution to saving our environment. The water bottles we are planning to order will provide students, who may require them, an appropriate, well-designed bottle with the school logo on and will last longer than single-use water bottles, thus not contributing to the amount of plastic pollution nor the drastic effects on our environment, which we are attempting to at least reduce and eventually completely stop.
