In the DT and Food Classroom

What an amazing start to 2023 in the DT and Food classrooms! Year 7 in DT have been developing their designing and communication skills to create solutions for their hoop games.

Year 7 in Food and Nutrition have been gaining a secure understanding of Food Hygiene and safety in the kitchen and started to develop practical skills such as use of the bridge and claw, weighing and measuring liquids and solids.











In the DT and Food Classroom (Continued)

KS4 in DT – Year 10 have taken their base knowledge to a high level and investigated the appropriateness of materials and construction techniques while designing and making a product for a specific client.



Year 11 continue to produce high levels of NEA work to support their final GCSE.



KS4 in Food and Nutrition – Year 10 have been developing their knowledge Macro and Micronutrients in the diet,

their sources, function and know the effect of an excess or deficiency in the diet. For each key nutrient a dish has been made to develop skills and enable links to be



made between nutrition and specific key ingredients whilst developing technically challenging dishes.



Year 11 continue to work hard on their NEA 2 planning, preparing and cooking a range of dishes suitable for specific needs.

In the Science Classroom

Science Wow Sessions

As part of The Sutton Experience, the Science department has been running fortnightly Science Wow session for students in Years 7 and 8. Students have had the chance to carry out some practicals that extend their learning of our Science curriculum.

Chemistry work has included making their own indicator (from red cabbage) and universal indicator, and testing them on substances with a known pH value.

Physics work has included making a simple circuit in a Christmas card so that it lights up.

Biology work has included dissecting fish heads to have a look at how the gills of a fish differ to the lungs of a mammal.



Students have been very enthusiastic for all the practicals, and they have been a wonderful group of students to work with. Arlen in Year 8 says "We combine the brains and wit of Science with the fun and crazy of our young minds. We have burnt things, wired circuits and even dissected creatures that we have been provided with!"

Science Wow takes a break while we support Year 11 with their exams, but will return later in the school year.





In the Science Classroom (Continued)


The departments KS4 clinic has been well attended by Year 11 students. The students have been working hard to cement previous knowledge. If you want to come along it is open to all Year 11 on a Thursday in B208. Year 11 have been focussing on their mock exams. In lessons the students are finishing the remaining bits of content then the lessons will focus on revision.

As a reminder, all Year 11 received a revision pack at the start of half term 2, containing a revision guide, checklists, workbook and key terminology lists. Students should be working



through these resources and Century.

Year 10 are currently working on the second part of the year curriculum. The students are working toward a Paper 1 mock, which will take place at the end of year. The students have access to knowledge organisers for all the units which have been completed. They need to start to use these to help them revise for their mock exam. More details will follow.




The students have been enjoying completing required practical's for Hooke's Law, specific heat capacity, making salt, insultation, endothermic & exothermic reactions.

It has been a pleasure to see them getting stuck in and enjoying the practical elements of the course.

Year 9 are working hard to bridge the gaps between KS3 and GCSE. The students are working on fundamental topics which they need a good grounding in to achieve at GCSE. They students are enjoying both theory and practical lessons. At KS3 the students continue to be challenged with a wide range of topics. Next half term students will be focusing on the Earth and Genetics.





In Year 7 the students will be looking at the structure of the Earth, rock cycle and the universe.


They will also be focussing on why we are all different despite all being humans, fertilisation and development stages of a foetus.

We hope to have exciting news coming regarding trips and other activities soon.


BRS are getting ready to join the BIG LENT WALK to help fight Global poverty this Lent.
